**Agroforestry Specialist, Winston Gamache**, leads AWES' greenhouse propagation, planting a variety of species this spring, including 1200 hybrid poplar and 400 willow cuttings. Stock salvaged from previous planting seasons has a home too, including saskatoons, dogwood and lilacs. This internal propagation is a promising avenue for AWES to provide affordable trees and shrubs to communities throughout Alberta. The future is leafy.

### Lions, and tigers, and trees! Oh, my!

The AWES spring planting season saw success with a **total of 340,740 seedlings in the ground.** We planted sites of 100 stems up to 170,000 stems. However, we did not do it all by ourselves; the local municipalities of Parkland, Sturgeon, Grande Prairie and Bonnyville partnered with us by providing planters, funding and coordination on several projects. Implementing contractors also ensured our larger scale projects happened on time and on budget.

60% of our total planting projects involved the <u>2 Billion Trees Program</u> (2BT). The program provides funding for half of every project they partner on. We are excited to continue offering this financial aid to landowners.

The fall plant is just around the corner and AWES has already allocated 90% of our 175,000 seedlings; Alberta is excited about trees and so is Manitoba!

Manitoba's East Interlake Watershed District has reserved 19% of the Fall stock and hope to increase this quantity in the coming years.



## **Extension Events** Panels & Workshops

This spring we did more than just plant trees; we connected with the community. We spoke at events like Stony Plain Horticultural Society's "The Real Dirt on Plants, Pests and Soils" and Rocky View County's "Trees & People: Shelterbelts, Ecobuffers, and Supporting Natives Species."

The Pleasure Island Fish Pond, in the Camrose region, and the Entwistle Campground, in Parkland County, hosted two of this year's planting workshops. Don't worry if you missed these because we have more to come! Look for us at our Riparian Workshop on September 28th at the Ellis Nature Centre.
